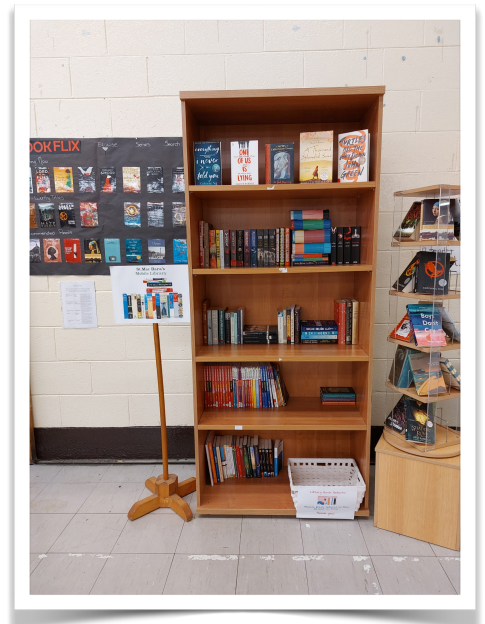
Adult Education

School Library

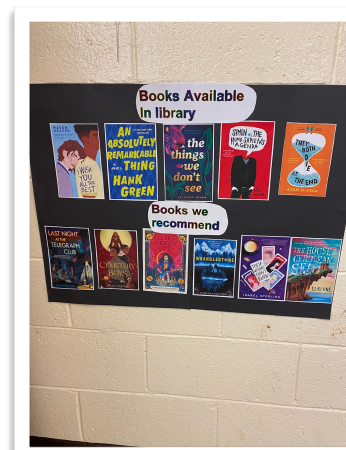
Our pop-up school library opened to students this October with thanks to the Parents Association.

Students have been learning vital life-saving skills in their PE classes this year.

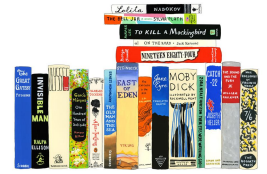
The PE department have linked up with the Irish Heart Foundation and are teaching our students how to deliver CPR if needed.

I love being a part of Comhairle because it gives me a voice and gives me the power to make actual change for young people.

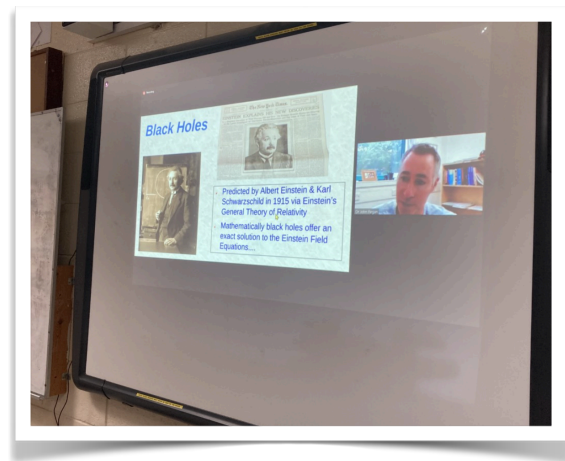


Physics Online

Report from Student Council 2021

It has been a busy and hectic year for all the members of the St Mac Daras Student Council. Our Council was elected in December 2020 using the proportional representation voting system, but due to Covid it was mid-April before we got the chance to meet in person. We met online via Zoom several times in this period and were set up and ready to hit the ground running when we returned to school buildings. We have been involved in several initiatives over the course of the last year and we have detailed a small sample of these below.

Uniform Proposal

We made a proposal to management that all students would have the option to wear a skirt or a trouser uniform. Students, staff and parents were surveyed on this and there was over 90% support for the proposal. As a result, a new uniform policy is now being drawn up to reflect this change and we will have more information on this in the new year.

Canteen

There hasn't been a canteen service in our school since the start of the 2020 academic year. Students have been requesting this so we have suggested the option of a click and collect service with a local food provider and hope that this will be up running after the February mid-term break.

Mural

The Council are working on a mural to go on the container beside the PE hall. To do this we are collaborating with the TYs and artist Andrea Turcan. This mural will attempt to capture aspects of school life and the inclusive nature of the school. Work on the mural will begin in the new year.

Menstrual Products

A consistent supply of menstrual products in the bathrooms is necessary for students and we have been taking an active role in monitoring this and keeping it going. Thank you to all the teachers who supported us on this.

Christmas Decorations

We want to thank St.Jude's GAA club for the donation of a huge Christmas Tree. This was a major part of the Christmas decoration that we did in the school on behalf of all students. We also ran a Festive Door competition which had an 'upcycling' theme to promote the reduction of waste around Christmas time.

Overall, we have thoroughly enjoyed our time in office and we hope the next council which will begin work in 2022 get as much fun and satisfaction out of the role as we did.

TY Mentors

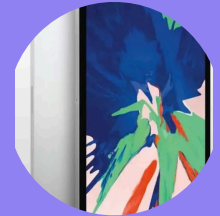

Guest Speakers

During our school year so far we have had a GOAL and PlanAfrica speaker come visit us during some of our classes. They have showed us how we can potentially make an impact on our planet and the people that are more in need/less fortunate. We have been shown how we can directly make an impact in our country and on an international level.

GOAL goes to Africa and Syria and visits the local schools to teach children basic life skills and how to survive so that they are learning skills for their future. GOAL also delivers care packages to these countries that, these contain food, water, and medicines. Just 50 euro is enough to feed a whole family for one month.

PLanAfrica does things in multiple countries and not just Africa alone. They do make trips to Africa multiple times per year and live the same lifestyle as the people who live there and help them. They patrol the area and destroy any poacher traps so they can protect the local animals. They rehabilitate any animals that were stolen and try prepare them for going back into the wildlife. If the animals are unable to return to the wilderness then they will stay in care. For our own local community PLanAfrica has a meet up/ gathering of people who will bring either food, clothes or hot drinks. They will split into smaller groups and go around Dublin to the homeless population and gift them some of these things.

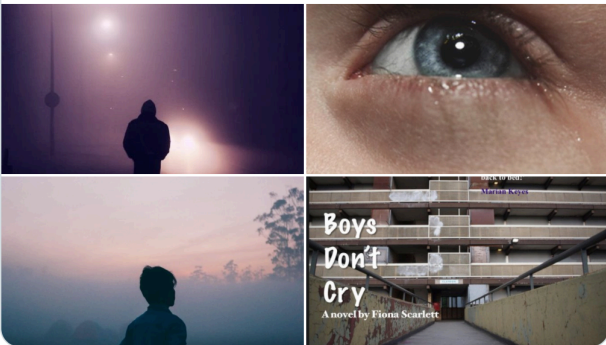

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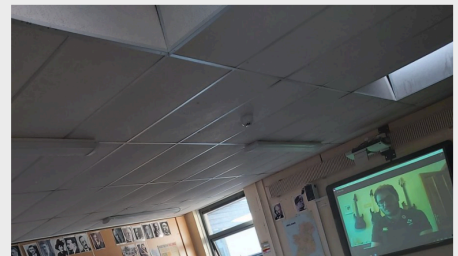
